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## Hidden Gems at Fiske Library: Discovering History in the Map Cabinet



You never know what treasures you might uncover in the Fiske Library map cabinet. Since Fiske doesn't have a vertical file for small and unusual items, the map cabinet is an alternative for holding some of the hidden gems normally found in a vertical file. Recently I uncovered a couple that I want to share with you.

Since I have relatives that lived in Seattle starting in the 1890's and all through the 1900's, it made sense that I should check out what Fiske Library had that would help me learn where they lived. One resource that I found quickly was the Polk's Seattle City Directories. These helped with discovering the exact years they lived in Seattle, at what address, and other adults who lived in the house.

A resource I hadn't checked until recently for finding address locations was the Fiske map cabinet. Expecting to see large city maps inside the drawer, I was surprised and intrigued when I opened it up. The first two items I saw were newspapers, not maps. The first newspaper was a photocopy of the front page of the Seattle Sunday Times from 1944 with the heading "Seattle's Pioneer Mansions," by Margaret Pitcairn Strachan. It had a picture and story about the Denny Mansion.



Even though my relatives were not wealthy enough to live in a mansion, the stack of newspapers with articles about many of the large mansions and houses in Seattle that I found drew me in. I've been fascinated by Seattle's original settlers ever since I moved to Washington in the 1970's (even doing the underground tour early on). It was wonderful to pull out the stack of newspapers mounted on cardboard and look through them and see names of people that I had heard about including Henry Yesler, David and Arthur Denny, Judge Thomas Burke, George Kinner, Guy C. Phinney, Clarence Bagley, David Maynard, and many others. Here I found stories about them, their wives, their children and the houses they built and lived in. For anyone who is interested in house histories, as well as Seattle's history, this is a great resource.

The second newspaper in the drawer was a copy of the November 1, 1918, "The Stars and Stripes," the Official Newspaper of the A.E.F., published in Paris, France. What a find! My grandfather was in France in 1918 serving with the 23<sup>rd</sup> Cavalry as part of Battery F, 81<sup>st</sup> Field Artillery. Maybe he read this newspaper. I will never know, but the thought that he might have is such a thrill.

Even though this newspaper did not add to my knowledge of where my family lived in Seattle, it is adding to my knowledge about my grandfather's life in France during World War I.

I still need to dig deeper in the drawer to see what else I can find that will help me locate my family's homes and how the city streets they lived on have changed over the years. For now, I am content with the two treasures I found. Come explore the Fiske Genealogical Library map cabinet. Maybe you will find an exceptional treasure just like I did.

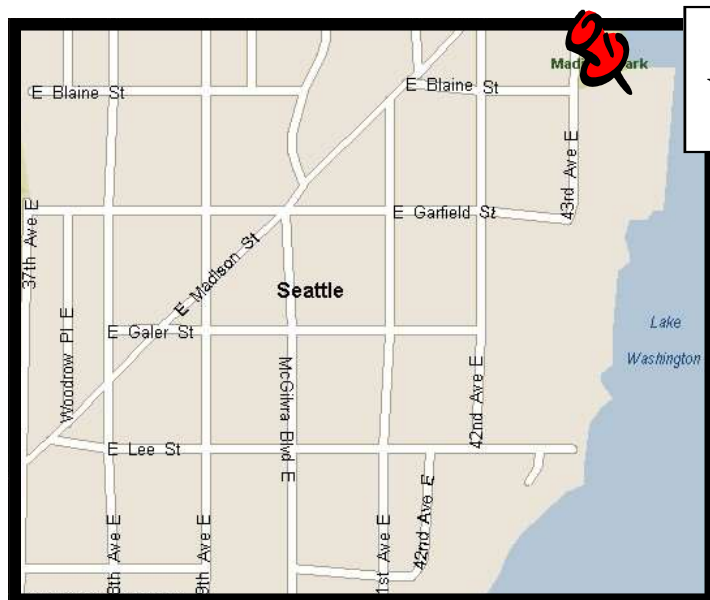
