## Award-Winning Nickerson Genealogy Added to Fiske Collection

The Fiske Genealogical Library has expanded its genealogical holdings with the addition of *The Nickerson Family, the Descendants of William Nickerson, Part 5: Samuel*, recently donated by Fiske volunteer Linda Blais. The library already holds Parts One and Two of this multi-volume genealogy, and the new addition strengthens its resources for researchers studying early New England families.

Published by the Nickerson Family Association in 2024, the *Nickerson Family* series documents the descendants of William and Anne Nickerson, early founders of Chatham, Massachusetts. In October 2025, *Part 5: Samuel* received the **Richard G. Tomlinson Award for Literary Excellence**, presented by the Connecticut Society of Genealogists. This award recognizes the best overall entry in the Society's annual literary awards competition.

The 600-page volume focuses on the descendants of Samuel Nickerson, an eighth-generation family member, and includes vital statistics for the ninth generation as well as allied families. Detailed biographical sketches, photographs, and extensive source citations make the book a valuable reference for both genealogists and historians.

Linda Blais served as a writer and co-editor on the award-winning volume. Her donation reflects the broader contributions of Fiske volunteers, whose genealogical expertise often extends beyond the library to support family associations, historical societies, and scholarly publishing.

## Burke's Peerage

In seeking out sources for British genealogy, one convenient, easily accessible source has been Burke's Peerage. John Burke, an Anglo-Irish genealogist started the series in 1826. The alphabetical name format was easy to navigate, and later editions covered a wide range of categories. It was exceedingly useful in the 19th century--a social registry Blue Book for knowing who's who.

Many poo-poo it now as inaccurate or even fictitious in places, although recent editions have made corrections. The fictional aspects usually relate to early history rather than more recent generations. A reminder that any source needs to be cross checked for accuracy. And obviously, not everyone descends from "nobility." But the Burke series includes not only nobility, but volumes on landed gentry, colonial gentry, knights etc. Note that many titles were passed out by the Crown to people whose services proved useful, usually from noble families, but not always. It is exceedingly hard to get a handle on some families because every generation uses the same set of family names. Knowing where family lines proliferated can provide clues.

The "BurkesPeerage.com" modern [website](#) requires a subscription and is pricey, although interesting to peruse. Earlier editions are freely available and downloadable online. The "Burke's Peerage, Wikipedia" [article](#) provides a nice list of links.

My personal library includes: [The dates simply refer to the editions I was able to download; the same titles were reprinted at other times.]

1847 - A Genealogical and Heraldic Dictionary of the Landed Gentry of Great Britain. Useful for likely connections of more middle class folk, merchants, soldiers, clergy, lawyers etc. possibly linked to noble families or just rich enough to buy an estate.

1895 - A Genealogical and Heraldic History of the Colonial Gentry. Useful for linking far-flung families to families in Britain.

1914 - A Genealogical and Heraldic Dictionary of the Peerage and Baronetage. In addition to the standard main body of peers and barons, this edition gives considerable space to understanding "precedence" -- where one fits in the hierarchy of titles. I found it illuminating.

1977 - A Genealogical and Heraldic History of the Extinct and Dormant Baronetcies of England, Ireland, and Scotland.


